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WHAT DOES 'MOBILITY WINDOW' MEAN?

Academic Cooperation Association defines mobility window as a period of time reserved for international student mobility that is embedded into the curriculum of a study programme.

The main objectives of the initiation are to increase willingness to study abroad with standardised credit recognition, and helping the students to plan their studies and mobility, knowing that mobility has a fixed place in the study programme.

In other words, if a student wishes to spend a semester abroad during his/her studies, he/she is offered to do it within the mobility window. Of course, the allocated semester is only a recommendation, students may choose any semester for it.



Mobility windows give students the assurance that participating in mobility will not cause them to skip a semester or result in an increased level of workload, and ensure that their credits will be recognized at their home university.

However, it is important to add that it does not replace the careful planning of studies and deep focus is still required in organizing the mobility.

According to the Sociology BA study programme, the **fourth semester** is the most ideal for studying abroad.

This semester, there are only two mandatory subjects (*Social Structures and Processes 2*; *Main Streams of Social Thinking*), which are not prerequisites for any further subjects. Therefore, students have two options: choosing a similar course at the foreign institution, or completing them during their last semester at ELTE.

The mobility can be completed by studying related fields of sociology, subfields of sociology, or methodology:

- ESZOCBA-EM-4 Erasmus - Related fields 1.
- ESZOCBA-EM-5 Erasmus - Related fields 2.
- ESZOCBA-EM-6 - Erasmus - Methodology
- ESZOCBA-EM- 1 - Erasmus - Subfields of sociology 1.
- ESZOCBA-EM-2 - Erasmus - Subfields of sociology 2.
- ESZOCBA-EM- 3 - Erasmus - Subfields of sociology 3.

According to the International Relations BA study programme, the **fifth semester** is the most ideal for studying abroad.

During the mobility, students should complete courses which are similar to the following:

- IRB116 International economy - 4 credits
- ESZOCBA77 Philosophy (for social scientists) - 3 credits
- ESZOCBA81 Cultural Anthropology - 3 credits
- IRB128-T-GY Thematic Courses - 5 credits
- IRB128-T-EA Thematic Course - Lecture - 5 credits

It can be combined with any other courses, which may be recognized as elective subjects at ELTE.

Therefore, the **third semester** is the most ideal for studying abroad.

During the semester abroad, students should complete mandatory elective regional and thematic courses. These can be combined with any other subjects, which may be recognized as elective subjects at ELTE.

MOBILITY WINDOW

In the Cultural Anthropology master's programme, mandatory subjects are organized in the first two semesters. As a result, it is best to plan your study abroad in the **third semester**.

According to the programme structure, students must obtain the total credit value for each thematic group. Subjects of these topics can be completed not only at Eötvös Loránd University, but also abroad.

In short, students should complete **thematic subjects** abroad. Of course, they can also accomplish any other courses, which may be recognized as **elective subjects** at ELTE.

The thematic groups and subjects are the following:

1. Anthropological Theories and Methods - *15 credits*
2. Specialized Anthropologies - *31 credits* - Religious Anthropology, Social Anthropology; Economic anthropology; Political anthropology; Aesthetic anthropology; Visual anthropology.
3. Peoples of the World - *15 credits* - Anthropology of Africa; Anthropology of America; Anthropology of Australia and Oceania; Anthropology of Asia; Anthropology of Europe.

According to the study programme, compulsory courses are offered to be completed in the first two semesters. In the last year, only compulsory elective courses remain to be studied.

Therefore, the **third or/and fourth semester** is the most ideal for studying abroad.

During the semester abroad, students should complete the mandatory-elective courses. These can be combined with any other subjects, which may be recognized as elective subjects at ELTE.

According to the study programme, most of the mandatory courses are offered to be completed in the first and second semesters. Therefore, the **third semester** is the most ideal for studying abroad.

During the mobility:

- Students should complete the block of mandatory elective courses (18 credits). These can be combined with any other subjects, which may be recognized as elective subjects at ELTE.
- Thesis Seminar 1. can be completed remotely.
- The other compulsory course (EKCM113.1 - Regional and Community Economic Development) can be easily acquired abroad. If not, the course can also be offered as an exam course in the fourth semester and completed at ELTE.
